Black History Month – CPA remembers Britain’s First Black Police Officer

Black police officers have played an important role in serving UK communities for almost 190 years, since the dawn of modern policing in 1829. The earliest known is Constable John Kent who policed Cumbria in the 1830s, the son of Thomas Kent a freed black slave. John was described as ‘Black Kent, a person of colour’ in a letter written to the Carlisle Journal newspaper in July 1844. This matter featured in Michael Ewins’ montage of the ‘History of the Cumbria Constabulary through the Ages’, still on display at Penrith Police Headquarters where an appropriately attired black officer is depicted.

Constable John Kent started his career in 1835 as a constable in Maryport on the Cumbrian coast before transferring to Carlisle City Police in 1837. He seems to have policed in a time when what you did was more important than the colour of your skin. He

was accepted as a tough, brave copper. Within weeks of starting, reports show he saved a senior constable’s life; faced a knife-wielding mob and disarmed a man armed with a blunderbuss. Along with this he also dealt with the more routine matters of assaults, thefts, counterfeiting, burglary and he was assaulted himself. On one occasion it was recorded of John having being ‘ill-used’ – a probable description of having been subject to racial abuse. John was rightly praised for his work on numerous occasions and by Magistrates who described him as ‘an active and intelligent policeman’.

In 2018 former Cumbrian Police Inspector Raymond Greenhow launched his book, ‘Britain’s First Black Policeman: The Life of John Kent: a Police Officer in Cumberland 1835-1846’. Amongst other discoveries, Ray’s research found new evidence that John Kent later went on to other aspects of law enforcement, firstly as a court bailiff, then as a Constable in Longtown, before

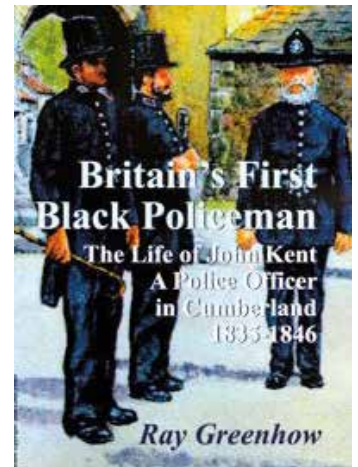

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later becoming a 'Railway police officer'. His book fleshes out this conscientious, fearless and respected police officer, universally known as Black Kent who today is still very much a part of the history of Cumbria.

In 2019 Maryport Town Council paid for a blue plaque to commemorate this Cumbrian hero, a unique privilege to recognise the service John Kent gave the town. Cumbrian Police officers, Marcia Reid-Fotheringham (Cumbria's first black High Sheriff), the local MP and others including myself attended the town on 26 October 2019 to see MP Sue Hayman unveil the blue plaque on Brow Street, which is where Maryport's jailhouse used to be.

'May we experience the love of Christ then we will be made complete with all the fullness of life and power that comes from God.' Eph 3:16-19 NLT

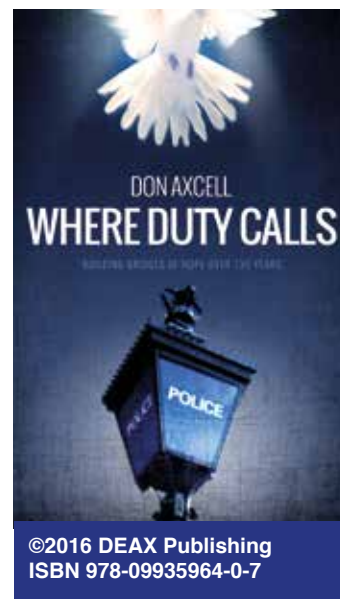
From the Director
